




Editorial Foreward




President's Welcome



To the Young Captains of Our Fleet

Dear my AIYA friends,

First and foremost, I would like to extend my gratitude to AIYA and all its members for the unwavering dedication and efforts in fostering invaluable people-to-people connectivity between Indonesia and Australia. It is through your collective endeavours that the bond between our nations continues to flourish, with youth serving as the cornerstone of our bilateral relationship

In Australia, Generation-Z is accounted for 18.2 percent of the population, millennials is 21 percent. So in total, about 39 percent of the Australian population is a young and productive generation. With the same token, in Indonesia, Generation-Z is about 28 percent while the millennials is about 26 percent. As such, about 54 percent of Indonesia's population is a young and productive generation. Notably, the younger generation in both countries shares a common trait of environmental consciousness.

With such sustainability awareness, this young generation will become the key drivers of the Indonesia-Australia Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (IA-CEPA), laying the foundation for a robust economic alliance between our nations.

In fact, as a region, ASEAN's young people also share the same traits. They play a strategic role both in current and ASEAN-Australia Comprehensive Partnerships, particular in the aspects sustainability. Melbourne Declaration 2024 calls for young professionals in Australia and Southeast Asia to build experience and strengthen connections. Australia's Southeast Asia Economic Strategy 2040 should be understood from this perspective as well.

AIYA, as one of the youth-focused organisations, has become a solid bridge between both countries in spreading good vibes and friendships through education cultural events, as well as from exchange language programs, competitions of speech and sports, to academic seminars.

At the end of 2023, AIYA NSW hosted our annual **Malam Trivia** in conjunction with Value Learning and the Australia-Indonesia Youth Exchange Program (AIYEP). We were excited to invite the 2023 Indonesian AIYEP delegates to our Malam Trivia and the event was well attended, with over 50 people sharing Indonesian and Australian food and testing their general knowledge.


South Australia






The success of this program in connecting young Australians and Indonesians is noted and the committee looks forward to returning this program to service in the 2024 period.

2023 was an exciting year for AIYA Sulawesi Selatan. After two years of navigating the pandemic with mostly online activities, we were finally able to transition to offline events, reconnecting the youth of South Sulawesi—particularly in Makassar with opportunities related to Australia and Indonesia. The committee introductions LPDP session were held offline at a university in Makassar, in collaboration with the campus, to introduce AIYA to students and broaden our reach.

In March, we organised a Language Exchange event at Fort Rotterdam, one of Makassar's historical landmarks. The session focused on effective strategies for building and utilising networks to pursue study or work opportunities, creating a meaningful platform for participants to engage and learn.

To capture the interest of young people in AIYA, we organised several educational events open to the public. These included an Australia Awards Scholarship Preparation Seminar in April, a Working Holiday Visa in Australia sharing session in May, and an JELTS Listening and Reading Skills Training. In addition, we hosted funactivities such as Colouring Day, Bead Crafting, and a museum trip as bonding events to engage both our members and newcomers.

One of the key highlights of 2023 was AIYA Sulawesi Selatan's opportunity to volunteer at the Australia Alumni Gala Dinner, organised by the Australian Consulate General. This gave us the chance to connect with Australian alumni and build strong relationships with the Australian Consulate General in Makassar, which has continuously supported our chapter's activities by involving AIYA members in numerous events.

We concluded the year with the "AIYA Goes to Campus" event at Universitas Hasanuddin. This event aimed to introduce AIYA to students through presentations, sharing sessions, and discussions about the benefits of being involved in a non-profit organisation, particularly AIYA. The event wrapped up with fun and competitive Kahoot games, covering a variety of topics from general trivia to Australia-Indonesia bilateral relations, designed to boost the students' knowledge and interest in AIYA in an engaging and interactive way.

Looking ahead to 2024, we are eager to see AIYA Sulawesi Selatan continue to grow and thrive by connecting, informing, and inspiring the youth of South Sulawesi. We hope to strengthen our relationships with both AIYA chapters and external organisations, providing our members and volunteers with valuable opportunities. Additionally, we aim to organise more impactful and enjoyable activities that not only foster connections but also encourage youth engagement, empowering them to become future agents of change.





Victoria

In 2023, AIYA Victoria held the most events out of any AIYA chapter, continued to prove its adaptability and openness to new ideas and collaborations, and showcased its status as a tenacious chapter within the Australia-Indonesia Youth Association.

In reflection, 2023 was a rather **unorthodox year**, as Chapter President Lachy mostly presided from Canberra. Lessons were certainly learned, and the 2023 committee demonstrated passion and perseverance in adapting to new circumstances and generating a steady flow of events throughout the year. It is also a testament towards the partnership between Lachlan and Vice President Angus, who lead the committee through these unconventional circumstances.



On a separate note, our committee leadership has always been a team amongst other player branches. To this effect, in 2023, we are proud to have donated over AUD 10000 towards AIYA National and other AIYA branches to help them continue their operations into the future.



We look forward to finding new collaborate with our ways to colleagues amazing across Australia and Indonesia and mutually support one another.



Language Exchange (LX) once again proved to be one of our most engaging events, providing weekly opportunity for **AIYA** members, students and the broader community to practise their English and Bahasa Indonesia skills. We also experimented more with facilitating online game night collaborations with AIYA NSW and have continued to brainstorm new methods of member engagement.

We also continued to collaborate with the Krakatoas Football Club through an AFL practice session and a Grand Final watch party at KIRI Melbourne. Both the Krakatoas and KIRI Melbourne staff continue be some of our biggest supporters, and we are immensely grateful for their generosity.

Last year was also filled with some incredibly ambitious collaborations, namely our collaboration with PPIA Victoria on IKAN 2023 and our collaboration with Miles Productions, Lamunan Studios and facilitate AIYA National to Australian of the hit tour film Indonesian Petualangan Sherina 2 (Sherina's Journey 2).

Our collaboration with PPIA Victoria to deliver both an Indonesian Literary Symposium, as well as a Gamelan and Wayang day will remain one of our Chapter's biggest collaborations, and we have already discussions begun about potential continuity into 2024.



Equally as exciting was our committee's hard work in developing, coordinating and facilitating a film screening of Petualangan Sherina 2 at Lido Cinemas in Melbourne. This was our most attended event of the year, with well over 500 people attending over two screenings, and it highlighted the massive Indonesian diaspora network within Melbourne and their strong desire to see more Indonesian films in Australian cinemas.

It truly cannot be understated that the success of our 2023 year would be nonexistent without our amazing, working committee, many of whom went beyond their responsibilities to ensure our events received the support they required. The team should not just be proud of what they've helped us as a chapter accomplish this year, but they should also be proud of their positive community impact and outreach.



Western Australia



After a period of hibernation due to various reasons, such as the pandemic, AIYA National. partnership with the Consulate General of the Republic Indonesia in Western Perth, Australia (WA), agreed on the importance and niche that the Australia-Indonesia Youth Association would occupy in Perth. After an initial meeting early in 2023, recruitment was underway, seeking to fill numerous executive and operational positions within AIYA WA. As a result of that recruitment, Anastasia Koo was appointed as President, Dhiya Aisy as Vice President, and Natasha Tjemerlang as our Communications Officer. Between the three of us we worked hard to promote AIYA WA awareness at the start of semester events hosted by other student groups in 2024.

Early on, we decided the importance of a relaunch event, serving as a "grand reestablishment" of sorts to ensure the exposure of AIYA WA considering most young people within the Australia Indonesia nexus (in Perth) had not heard of AIYA. Anastasia and Aisy met with Ibu Listiana Operananta, Consul-General of the Republic of Indonesia in Perth, to further discuss support and collaboration with KJRI Perth. From there AIYA WA hosted a successful relaunch at KIRI named 'AIYA WA Relaunch: Westward Bound'.

We reconnected with organisations AIYA WA had previously worked with and established new bonds, while garnering interest from the youth community who understand the importance of connection and community within the Australia-Indonesia bilateral space.

Chapter Updates

The team consists of past exchange students, Indonesian language students, Australians with Indonesian heritage and Indonesian international students.

With this diverse and highly competent group of passionate youth, we look forward to holding consistent social events as well as push for the ambitious task of running an annual Australia-Indonesia Quiz/Trivia night. Our social events will encompass language exchanges, sports activities, classes, and outings. With the support we have from the community, likeminded organisations, and passionate people, we look forward to where we can go in 2024, and to ensure the longevity of AIYA WA.

NAILA 2023

On Saturday, 2 December, the winners of the National Australia Indonesia Language Awards (NAILA) 2023 were recognised at the NAILA Awards Ceremony in Glebe Town Hall, Sydney.

NAILA is an annual speech competition for young Australians who are learning Indonesian.

The competition is open to students in primary school, secondary school and university and young professionals. To enter the competition, contestants film themselves delivering a speech on a particular theme in Indonesian. These speeches are then evaluated by an independent panel of expert judges.

The theme for NAILA 2023 was "Food/Makanan" with the question being "How does food bring communities together?" This year NAILA received 86 submissions across 7 award categories.

The NAILA Awards Ceremony was the culmination of a day of cultural immersion for the awardees who come from across Australia, including the Australian Capital Territory, New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia, and Tasmania.

Commencing the day at the Indonesian Consulate General in Sydney, awardees and their families had the opportunity to meet the Indonesian Consul General Vedi Kurnia Buana and his wife Fanny Erlita Buana, take part in a dance workshop led by Suara Indonesia Dance Group, play traditional Indonesian games including makan kerupuk (cracker eating game) and pulpen dalam botol (pen in bottle game) and learn how to make klepon, a traditional Indonesian green rice cake.





At the Awards Ceremony, each of the winners were presented their trophies and certificates by the NAILA judges and partners, following which they delivered their acceptance speeches in Indonesian. The winner of each award category also receives a cash prize.

NAILA also hosted the presentation of the Australia-Indonesia Institute (AII) Indonesian Studies Awards. These awards recognise the achievements and contributions of Indonesian language teachers, researchers and leaders in Indonesian cultural outreach in Australia. All of the recipients have worked in their respective fields for many years and often decades to promote Indonesian Studies in Australia.

At the conclusion of the event, Co-Director Jade Lee revealed the theme for NAILA 2024 which will be "Innovation/Inovasi", following which the audience were treated to a captivating performance by Suara Indonesia Dance Group.

Congratulations to all our winners and to everyone involved in helping make the event such a great success.

Introducing Indonesia through the Language **Assistant Program**

In 2024, Balai Bahasa Indonesia Perth, along with the Department of Education in Western Australia, is once again inviting young Indonesians to serve as language assistants in several public schools across Western Australia. These language assistants spend a school year supporting language teachers in classrooms, sharing their cultural insights to enhance primary and secondary programs. This language initiative connects enthusiastic youths with schools interested in offering language programs.

Currently, four individuals are part of this program, with three in Perth and one in Geraldton. These four come from different regions, each with unique backgrounds. The program commenced on February 29, 2024, and will conclude in February 2025.

As part of this program, we have a role to assist Indonesian language teachers. We engage in various cultural activities, such as teaching angklung, traditional songs, and introducing our regional attire. In classrooms, we aid teachers in enhancing language assisting students in speaking practice, preparing materials, and guiding students in small group activities.

Moreover, as language assistants, we have the opportunity to participate in activities across Western diverse Australia. We become guest members of the Westralian Indonesian Language Teachers Association, organisations like AIYA WA, and engage in local sports clubs like yoga and badminton in Geraldton.

This program is mutually beneficial. For schools, having native language assistants provides invaluable support, offering materials and examples to aid student learning. For language assistants, it enhances skills such as and behaviour classroom management, lesson planning, teaching various levels in schools, and provides a life-changing experience of working in Western Australia.

Looking ahead, we hope for more similar opportunities, not only for Indonesian language assistants in Australia but also for Australian youths to serve as English language assistants in public schools in Indonesia. This exchange can strengthen and enrich the educational, linguistic, and cultural ties between both countries.





One Health Approach: A Holistic Way of Tackling **The Future Pandemics**

Did you know that the principles of One Health can be used to solve public health problems including the COVID-19 pandemic?

The Indonesian government has made various strategies to overcome the outbreak of COVID-19. One of them was carried out with support from the Australian government through the Australia-Indonesia Health Security Partnership (AIHSP). This important strategic partnership was declared by Indonesia's President Joko Widodo and Australia's Prime Minister Scott Morrison in February 2020. Australia has contributed AUD 7.5 million of technical assistance for the period 2020-2025. AIHSP aims to enhance the systems in Indonesia that prevent, detect and respond to infectious disease outbreaks that potentially threaten both regional and global health security.

AIHSP has a broader focus on the One Health approach that integrates people, animals and environmental health. Therefore, the program worked in close collaboration with Indonesia's Ministry of Health, Ministry of Agriculture, Ministry of Environment and Forestry.

The AIHSP program targets five priority areas including Central Java, Yogyakarta, South Sulawesi, Bali and East Nusa Tenggara (NTT). The range of activities has included the reinforcement of One Health policies and procedures for health emergencies and coordination between ministries; policies, procedures and coordination mechanisms for health security preparedness for zoonotic diseases at the national and sub-national level; improvement of disease surveillance and information systems; increased the capacity of laboratories in detecting emerging infectious diseases (EID) and zoonoses; improved the capacity of epidemiologists (public health and animal health); development of diagnostic tools, new drugs and vector control (Kemenkes, 2021).

Approximately 70% of all emerging pathogens are zoonoses, which means they originate in animals but have the potential to transmit to humans. Zoonotic pathogens include a wide variety of viruses, bacteria, fungi, parasites and prions. In recent decades, the world has faced several zoonoses such as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS), Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS), Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) and more recently Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19).

Further, an estimated 1.7 million unidentified viruses are present in mammals and birds, 700.000 of which could have the ability to infect humans (AIHSP, 2021). An increased risk of zoonoses is driven by the imbalance of human-animal-environment interactions (HAEIs).

As human populations continue to grow, habitat destruction such as deforestation also increases to make way for settlements and infrastructure projects. This ecological disruption brings humans and wildlife into closer contact, facilitating the spread of diseases. Additionally, overpopulation leads to a higher demand for food from agricultural and animal products (meat, poultry, milk and eggs).

In intensive farming systems, growth hormones and antibiotics are commonly used to maximize production and efficiency. Extensive antibiotic use promotes the evolution of antimicrobial resistance in zoonotic germs eventually.







Moreover, many activities in the livestock industry can rapidly spread infection either through direct contact with an infected animal or indirectly via contaminated objects like equipment and vehicles.

Prevention of further epidemics and pandemics can only be provided by the interdisciplinary One Health concept. One Health approach is based on the fact that human and animal health are mutual and bound to the health of the environment they live in. The foundation of this approach demands close collaboration, communication and coordination between the relevant sectors. Researchers and practitioners from human health (doctors, epidemiologists, public health experts), environmental health (ecologists, agricultural workers, wildlife experts), and animal health (veterinarians) should be committed to being involved in implementing the One Health agenda.



Furthermore, the World Health Organization (WHO) advances the One Health principles globally by providing strategic advice related to policy and conducting training at the local, national and regional levels. In addition, WHO alongside the World Organization for Animal Health (WOAH), the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) have developed a One Health Joint Plan of Action that includes establishing the needed infrastructure and funding.





WHO as the secretariat for the One Health High-Level Expert Panel (OHHLEP) also provides recommendations on good practice guidelines, a model One Health Surveillance System, a comprehensive list of upstream drivers of zoonotic disease spillover and recommendations to mitigate these risks (WHO, 2023). Besides the international frameworks, nations and local communities play a key role in putting One Health's approaches into practice. Several practical actions to prevent the next pandemics have included population control through family planning programs; biodiversity preservation by reducing deforestation or intensive land use; ensuring food security and good nutrition; promotion of personal hygiene practices; environmental sanitation improvement; combat wildlife trafficking and hunting. A holistic approach to disease prevention, detection, response and recovery can help to halt infectious diseases from graduating into pandemics as well as build a safer and healthier future for all living beings.
